

BROKEN ORGAN - SILENT NIGHT

Do you know the origin of that beautiful hymn "Silent Night"? It was Christmas Eve, and at the Church of St. Nicholas in the alpine village of Oberndorf, Austria, Father Joseph Mohr was preparing for the midnight service. He was distraught because the church organ was broken, requiring him to scrap the beautiful music he had planned.

He got an idea – to write a song that could be sung without the organ.

He wrote "Silent Night." His organist, Franz Gruber, set the poem to music, and on Dec. 24, 1818, it was sung for the first time as a duet.

It occurs to me that, in a day when friends, family, the news media and general public routinely complain that laws, relationships, marriage vows, the government, and even our country's economy and security are broken, we can all benefit greatly from a reminder that, were it not for a broken organ, there would never have been a "Silent Night".
