SUNDAY REFLECTIONS

Jonah's warning that the unfaithful city of Nineveh will be destroyed in 40 days inspired the people to repent. God saw this and spared the city.

Today our conflicts have again brought us to the brink of destruction. The specter of nuclear holocaust leers from the horizon. And yet, the Nobel Peace Prize was awarded in October 2017 to the International Campaign To Abolish Nuclear Weapons.

It is time for us to profess our belief in God and put on spiritual sackcloth – and yet to remember there is always room for hope.

Including Youth:

The first reading is very problematic for youth as well as for many adults. The translation says God "repented of the evil" God was planning to do to people. How do you help listeners understand this using today's language or examples?

The second reading is also problematic. Paul's

examples need to be explained in terms of "this earth is not our home." Everyone's "time is running out." Studies show that the death rate has stayed the same in the U.S. since the Declaration of Independence. It's still 100 percent.
