SUNDAY REFLECTION

A more positive take on this might be – shake off our disappointment, sense of failure, or supposed insult. If we don't hang



on to the negative feeling or take it too personally, we might be able to approach that person or group with an open heart at a later time. If we are really about doing God's work, what do we have to lose?

Including Youth

Jesus's spartan list of what the apostles should take on their missionary journey seems wildly unrealistic to us. However, it raises the question, "What do we actually, truly need?"

Pose the questions, "Which smartphone apps would you get rid of if every discard meant saving a human life?" (Remember, for every one you keep, someone dies.) If getting rid of the smartphone itself – for good – meant saving a hundred lives, would you? If getting off Facebook – for good – meant saving a thousand lives, would you? Social media has definite pluses and benefits. It can also be a master to which we become slaves.
