
July 9 - Fourteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time



SUNDAY REFLECTIONS

In today's Gospel Jesus tells us, "My yoke is easy and my burden light." Those of us who are skeptical and already know the demands of discipleship might ask, "How easy and how light!"

The 1930s movie star Mae West may have had an answer to that question. Known for her light-hearted, bawdy double entendres, she famously said, "I never said it would be easy, I only said it would be worth it." Mae would wink and add, "You only live once, but if you do it right, once is enough." Another of her famous lines: "I generally avoid temptation unless I can't resist it."
