

+ A parishioner had some equipment he thought a nurse could use in her work, so he donated it to her.


+ It has made me more aware of injustice in our own country: the disease has struck communities of color disproportionately due to a long history of discrimination in medical care; the homeless have much less protection than we who have a roof over our heads; the out-of-work are wondering how to feed their families and keep from having the water and electricity cut off; the members of poorer communities have no choice but to go to work and be exposed to the virus to a greater extent than we who wish we did not have to work from home; the powerful, greedy companies who take money which is meant for small businesses who are in desperate need to keep from going under.

+ Staying at home and working from home has given us more time with family. Being home has simplified life and made us realize the things that are truly important.

+ My son has become a better cook and is trying new recipes.

+ I have continued to work, but I have been saying a daily Rosary, which is something I had gotten out of the habit of doing, asking God's mercy on the whole world.

+ My daughter loves being a stay-at-home mom. She and her husband have accomplished many of the "someday" projects they had planned.

<u>REMINDERS FROM THE LETTER YOU</u> RECEIVED LAST WEEK:

1. If you are 65 years of age or older, you are highly encouraged NOT to attend Mass, at least through June. Remember the obligation to attend Mass has been dispensed until August 15.

2. You must wear a mask to Church. If you do not have one, the ushers will give you one as you enter church.

3. Only the vestibule door will be opened for entrance, but you may use the side door as you <u>exit</u> church.

4. You must observe the physical distancing standard of 6 feet apart.

5. Hand sanitizers will be available as you enter church. You are also encouraged to bring your own to be used before you receive Holy Communion.

6. Bulletins will continue to be sent by mail, or can be read on the webpage and Facebook.

7. The Archbishop is asking that for the month of June, you attend your home parish and not a neighboring parish.

8. You are encouraged to take your temperature before coming to Mass. The rule of thumb is anything over 100.4.
