
October 7 – Twenty-Seventh Sunday in Ordinary Time

When Pope Francis took the name of St. Francis, it seems he also took up the Lord's direction given amid the ruins of a small chapel in Assisi. "Go, rebuild my church." He is rebuilding the church by facing today's needs. He said the key is to hold justice and mercy together, not becoming obsessed with the fine points of legal interpretation.

Today's Gospel speaks about the sanctity of marriage. But, in the U.S., about half of first marriages and 80 percent of re-marriages end in divorce.
