The following is Fr. John's homily from last week:

There is a story about two friends who accidentally met on a city street. They were fraternity brothers in college, and they had not seen each other for years. As they talked, time flew by and suddenly it was 8:00 PM. Both of them should have been home two hours ago. They said a hasty goodbye, agreeing to meet at noon the next day. Over lunch the following day, one asked the other, "What did your wife say when you got home so late?' He said, "Nothing really. She was worried, but when I explained, she understood and that was the end of it. What about your wife?" The first man replied, "Well, my wife became historical." "Don't you mean hysterical?" "No, I mean historical. She brought up everything I have done wrong for the last fifteen years."

Our tendency is to let the hurts accumulate. We add the wounds of today to the hurts of tomorrow, and soon we are carrying more than the human spirit can handle. Life can't be lived this way. We have to let some things go.

Forgiveness is a difficult concept to grasp. Do we act as if nothing has happened? Pretend that we are not hurt or wronged? Ignore the one who sinned against us? Jesus gave his disciples the power to bind and to loose. How often do we choose to bind more than to loose?

Matthew's prescription for dealing with one who has sinned involves dialogue and witness. It is an approach that is not emotional but "established on the testimony of two or three witnesses," if a oneto-one conversation does not work.

God's love does not fail, particularly when we call on him as "two or three" in his name. Jesus says that a rupture between two people is not just between them. Every rupture fractures the community, especially within family.

The power of community is emphasized when Jesus said, "For where two or three are gathered together in my name, there am I in the midst of them." So we are Christ for one another. When we pay attention to Christ, he is really there.

God's absolute forgiveness is passed on to each of us. What we "bind on earth shall be bound in heaven, and what we loose on earth shall be loosed in heaven."

"Leave your gift there at the altar, go first and be reconciled with your brother, and then come and offer your gift."

Dear Jesus, help me to spread Thy fragrance everywhere I go. Flood my soul with Thy spirit and love. Penetrate and

Malcolm Muggeridge, the English journalist and convert to Catholicism, was filming Mother Teresa for a documentary. One day, the electricity was out, and he bemoaned the fact that he had to film her without lights, convinced that the day would be lost. However, when the film was developed, he noticed that the scenes were beautifully lit. To his surprise it appeared as though the light was coming from her.

"The first weapon – the most cruel weapon – is the tongue. Now you examine, what part has your tongue played in creating peace or violence? We can really wound a person – we can kill a person just with our tongue."

Mother Teresa used to walk through the streets of Calcutta helping those who were helpless. One day she found a Hindu man at the point of death. She brought him inside and cleaned him up. As she tended to him, she kept saying over and over, "You will see Jesus soon, you will see Jesus soon." The man looked at her and said, "If this Jesus is anything like you, I can't wait to meet him." Be Jesus to those you encounter.
